Simeon and Anna

Every new religious order in the Church has been founded around the special needs of the time when the order was founded. In reading the signs of the times, we determine what the Lord is calling us to. The Widows of Prayer have been founded around two special needs; prayer for the priesthood and adoration of the Lord. It is interesting that the Scripture passage that has been chosen as formative for the Widows, Luke 2:25-35, zeroes in on those two special concerns.

As is the custom in the Gospel of Luke, there is in this passage a balance between man and woman and their proper place in the Temple. Simeon might be said to represent the priesthood, holding Jesus in its arms and speaking of the future of the Church. Anna is the Widow of Prayer who discerns the Presence of the Lord in the hands of the priesthood and supports that presence with her own hymn of praise.

That is the task of the Widows of Prayer; to reverence the presence of the Lord in the hands

of the priesthood, the Eucharistic presence, and to proclaim this message to all who are part of the Church community. Anna is a beautiful example of holy widowhood just as Simeon represents holy priesthood, awaiting in hope the fulfillment of God's promises to his people. Anna was married for seven years and alone for seventy seven years. The three sevens involved are a symbol of holy completeness.

The task of the Widows of the early Church was to support the clergy and to assist those who were seeking perfection as consecrated virgins and those who were suffering for the faith. What the Widowhood of Prayer will be for the Church at this time in history will be determined by the present and future needs of the Church. But the reality of the presence of the Lord in his Church will always be their central concern as they take their place in the Community of the Faith.

What Have I Learned About the Widows of Prayer?

I have had the privilege of working with the Widows of Prayer for several years now and I have learned a great deal from them. She has to decide what she is going to do now that she is alone. Often her children are grown up and if she is fortunate she will have grandchildren to spend time with.

The women who have joined the Widows of Prayer seem to have found what they were looking for. The Widows of Prayer find fulfillment in their life in the ministry of praying for vocations and praying for priests. They have a rule of life which is helpful for them. They also have understanding and support from the others who have joined the Widows of Prayer with them. We come together once a week to spend time in Eucharistic adoration and celebration of Mass. Once a month we come together to share our reflections on a spiritual book we

have been reading. These sessions have proven to be very helpful in getting better acquainted with one another. It has really been a growing experience.

The Widows of Prayer might not be the way for all of those who lost their spouse, but my impression is that it is a very meaningful life for those who are able to embrace it. I see some beautiful signs of spiritual growth in the women in our group.
