Our Celebration

September 29th was overcast and rainy at times, but the loving arms of our Widows of Prayer were happily embracing one another as they entered the narthex of the St. Francis Xavier Cathedral in Green Bay. The Deacons were asking where they should vest, and the last-minute details for the Mass were being discussed.

The altar was richly decorated with 115 roses; red for the living Widows of Prayer and white roses to depict the deceased Widows of Prayer. The organist intoned the hymn, "You Are Mine" as the procession of Priests, Deacons and Altar Servers made its way to the Altar.



Father Tom Farrell, our Spiritual Director, began the prayers. Tom Groschel, Mary Reardon's son-in-law, proclaimed the first reading and Alice Peeters said the second reading.

In his homily, Father Tom spoke of the reason for the gathering and highlighted Mary Reardon's life and accomplishments. He explained how the Widows of Prayer are an asset to the life of the church and the need for them to continue. The apostolate helps redefine prayer for widows. From that, Father spoke on the power of prayer being the greatest weapon to change hearts, for good ministers, good leaders for our country, and to grow in faith and make right decisions.

He quoted St. Augustine: "Where there are good sheep you will find good shepherds." He then emphasized that Christ feeds His sheep, and that his sheep hear His voice. We need to learn how to listen and experience silent prayer.

Father Tom explained that God gave us a free will because He wanted to be freely loved - one's commitment to prayer comes from one's decision to love God freely. Prayer is not asking but rather listening to God's voice in the depths of one's heart. True silence is where only the soul can meet its God. Time spent in silence is holy. Silence is truth in charity. Quoting Mother Theresa, he said, "Joy is prayer, strength, love, a net of love by which you can catch souls."


bound, because of their age (one doesn't do much travelling at 100 years of age).
