## A Spirituality of Widowhood

Those of you who are choosing to be Widows of Prayer are also, by that fact, choosing to be women of destiny in the Church. You need to form a spirituality of Widowhood of Prayer that will serve not only your need for holy living but that will also enrich the widows of the future who will seek in this religious calling a means



of enriching their lives and also the vitality of the Church.

I cannot dictate to you what your Widowhood of Prayer ought to be. I can only ask you to look at some of the realities that should help to shape your vocation. To do that, you need to look at the greatest Widow of the Church, Our Lady herself. What was her attitude, her spiritual focus? Reflect on her joys, her resignation, her manner of searching out the meaning of life.

Mary said, "I am the servant of the Lord". How have you been the servant of the Lord throughout your life? What you have been has brought you to where you are. "Mary pondered all these things." The purpose of pondering is to see how things fit together and reveal the plan of God for your life.

"They have no wine." A non-controlling intercessory prayer. We are called not to tell God what to do but to open our heart to Him concerning the needs of our world, our Church, our family. Reflect on your own prayer stance and what might need to be changed in it.

"Do whatever He tells you." You are the Wisdomfigures for your family. It is important that your advice be liberating for them and not just a list of shoulds and should nots. If your loved ones know how to listen to God, they will come to the fulfillment of his will.

Develop a sound attitude toward faith sharing. Be a light to others, not a spotlight. Reflect on how you are called to be servants of Jesus and what being a Widow of Prayer means for you.

These reflections might be part of your gatherings together. Say what you feel and listen intently to what others are saying. Listen with an open mind and a non-judgmental attitude. You are gathering a treasure for the future. Make sure it is pure gold and not an alloy.

### **Know Your Seminarians**

Do you know who the seminarians are from your parish or Diocese? Not only do we, as Widows of Prayer, pray for our Priests, but we also pray for our seminarians. They are our future priests!

Some communities already have a very active ministry with their seminarians. For example, the Appleton Community requests the names of their diocesan seminarians and each Widow of Prayer chooses one, or sometimes two, seminarians to take "under her wing". This includes daily prayers for that special seminarian, staying in contact with emails or letters/cards especially on birthdays, holidays, etc. This ongoing relationship can produce a special bond with the seminarian. Other communities also pray for their seminarians and attend the ordination and/or First Mass of newly ordained priests.

The seminarian is so grateful that someone extra is praying for his vocation. In our last Widows' Mite, Fr. Aaron Esch (from Franklin/Milwaukee Community) commented that the Widows of Prayer "made such an impression upon me that these faithful women were praying for me all through my years in seminary... They are a great gift to the Church and have been a blessing to me".
