The Life of Mary as Seen by the Mystics

I've read this book at least three times. I never get tired of the images portrayed in the life of the Holy Family from St. Ann and St. Joachim to the Ascension. It gives added insight such as when no food was available for the Holy Family, Mary and Joseph each retired to their room and prayed. The angels prepared the table and set on it fresh bread, fish, fruit and jelly. On rare occasions Mary would command the birds to bring some fish, fruit or bread.

Such things as how Jesus and Our Holy Mother were involved in the plans of the Cana wedding or the passion and resurrection of Christ, I found to be most interesting.

Some of the things that I read, I have now incorporated in my meditations on the stations of the Cross and/ or the rosary. Because they are mystics such as St. Elizabeth of Schoenau, St. Bridget of Sweden, and others who have written about these events, one does not have to believe them.

This book was written and published in 1951 and has been reprinted several times up to 2014, which is my book.
