Learning about the lives of the saints is motivating, thought provoking, inspiring, empowering and a host of many other adjectives.

Having a fascination to read and hear more about the saints can bring us to the conclusion that "They are like me. They experienced some of the same things as I have had." or, we may say, "I never did those things...I wasn't that bad."

Saints as we all know, can be quite the variety from prayerful and never leaving the cloistered walls to those who are pushers and movers in founding religious orders, schools, etc. Some lives are short, maybe 12 to 20 years while others lived into their 70's and 80's.

By all these differences, what can we derive from their lives? Obviously, the common thread is love of God and love of fellowman. They are willing to sacrifice their own life for the kingdom of God.

I viewed some of the saints who are currently on the 2022 Church calendar for March and April.

We have Saint Joseph whose life exemplified the virtues and fruits of the Holy Spirit to the utmost. In his deep love for God, he accepted the roll of physical spouse of the Blessed Mother and unconditionally followed in God's path in the role as the foster father of Jesus. The virtues of being the protector, just, obedient, faithful and so on give us all an example to imitate.

We find that St. Frances of Rome, used all her means and sold her possessions to give to the poor; St. John Baptist de La Salle left his position as a canon and gave away his wealth to become poor. Retreat. That's when she met and visited with Mary Reardon. When Catherine asked Mary how many women were in the group, Mary replied that if she joined, she would became the 12th member. She made her first promise in May 2002.

Catherine is now the Servant Leader of the Huntington, Indiana, community. They meet weekly for prayer, scripture study and faith sharing. Once a month they meet with the Fort Wayne Community for a holy hour and then go out to share a meal. The Huntington Widows of Prayer also lead the rosary for deceased parishioners. Seven years ago they had 15 funerals in 6 weeks! Catherine comments that this is her most precious devotion after Eucharistic Adoration.

Catherine has 5 children, 16 grandchildren and 24 great grandchildren. At least twice a month she has 3 to 7 children spending most of the weekend with her and her daughter Ann (including a sleepover). She says her hobbies "are my great grandchildren". But when they are not around, Catherine knits, crochets, enjoys reading mysteries, and makes & repairs rosaries and chaplets (both cord & chain). She also serves as a lector and Extraordinary Minister of the Eucharist.

My Other Self – by Clarence Enzler

A reprinted classic by Ave Maria Press helps one encounter Jesus in a very personal way. What drew me to the book was my experience praying with Enzler's **Every-one's Way of the Cross**. Traditional Stations always invoked a response to my savior. Praying with Enzler, my stations were very personal. This was not history, but my every day as a new widow. I better understood what it means to pick up my cross. In the 14th station, Jesus states. "But now another life begins for Mary...and you."

Having had a personal invitation to grow, I opened the book, *My Other Self*. Written in the style of *The Imitation of Christ*, the book through intimate conversations with the Master offers a way to transform daily life and routine into an intimate and prayer experience. I need not be sitting in a church; I may be focused completely on the task at hand, but because I am where He wants me, I can find the joy and be united with Jesus. I first read it with excitement and then went back and prayed the book, working it and looking for how to use the experiences. As a result, my prayer life has changed. Intimate conversations with Jesus are often. It has opened my eyes and I hope I now see where I can be Christ to others. It is not intimidating. I would recommend it for the beginner as well as one truly committed.
