From Our General Servant Leader

During this past year our new pastor Fr. Michael has been talking a great deal about thoughts, and how Satan tries to

enter our minds with negative thoughts. His remedy is praising God each and every time one encounters that type of situation. Of course, you can get frustrated, overwhelmed or just give up on the idea right? But his approach is to stop the thought which then can possibly stop the sin. I thought about it and did indeed take that practice to heart.



I then discerned it's not just the negative thoughts, but the busy active thoughts in general. Are we so preoccupied with thoughts, that we push God out of our minds? How much peace and quiet do we allow ourselves in a given day? Do we let God rest within us? How much do we let God talk to us? It's an interesting question to ask ourselves how much for me? How much for God?

Someone remarked to me recently, that her grandmother mentioned, "If the devil can't get a person to go his way, then he will keep him busy". Whoa that's a statement! Most of us would say that we are busy. I'd call busy a trademark these days.

Cardinal Sarah in his book *The Power of Silence* quotes, "Man must make a choice, God or nothing, silence or noise."

Reaching heaven is silence. Through prayer, daily Mass whenever possible, and offering up those sacrifices truly puts us on the heavenly path. We can work on silent prayer exercises whether it's the Ignatian spirituality or St. Therese of Avila's attentiveness to the presence of God or some other method. This closeness is not meant only for our meditation/contemplation time, but also while we go about doing our daily duties. Cardinal Sarah sums it up by saying, "There is no place on earth where God is more present, than in the human heart. This heart is truly God's abode the temple of silence... the Father waits for his children in their own hearts."
