What Does it Mean to be a Consecrated Widow? Why Have I Become a Widow of Prayer?

Becoming a Widow of Prayer is the fruit of one's prayer life, a coming to the point where the prayer calls you to

action. At first there seems to be a dialogue with the Holy Spirit, encouragements from God, personal hesitations, usually dealing with impediments we see within ourselves. We need to be convinced of what our heart already has chosen to follow. There is a feeling of unworthiness and what will people



think? This dialogue may go on a long time until we come to the point of saying, "Since I see myself as the Lord's servant, I HAVE to do what the Lord is calling me to do." The result of a firm decision for the Lord is a tremendous sense of joy.

Remember, God does His best work with little people! If you feel you're not worthy of the task, that means you're probably one of the chosen because then God will get the credit, not you. This is God's work. If He chooses you to do it for Him, it's because you're just what He's looking for.


To become one of His consecrated servants is to take on the grace of holiness. You want to become holy? Give God the full direction of your life.

I meet with our four remote members on the first Saturday of the month at the Oratory of the Holy Family in Rome City, IN. This is equal distance between Elkhart, South Bend and Huntington. This is the site of the visions of Our Lady of America to Sister Mildred.

Mary Therese Turner WP suffered an infection which made her very ill. She is still on Hospice but is slowly regaining her health. Peg broke her left leg just above the ankle the first week of January. She still is in a cast and cannot leave her home.

Our two parishes keep Holy Week as a week of Eucharistic Adoration. From noon on Palm Sunday until 5 pm Holy Thursday all parishioners are invited to keep a personal hour of adoration. Since 2003, we Widows of Prayer try to spread ourselves out so that at least one of us is before our Eucharistic Lord daily.


Spotlight on Widow of Prayer

She currently facilitates the Grief Ministry program which gives a 9 week program twice a year. She is a part of the Healing Ministry, the weekly Bible Study group, attends weekly Eucharistic Adoration, and brings Communion to the homebound. When she is not at church, she loves to quilt.

In 2014, Kathy took over as the Servant Leader for the Appleton group. Kathy stated that she likes that the WPs are an active and a contemplative group. As we get older, we can't really age out of our group; we sort of age into it. All we really have to do then is pray -- and that is extremely useful.
